FOURTEENTH DAY AFTER TRINITY

Almost everybody says that the parable today from Luke is very difficult. Jesus appears to be commending the behaviour of a dishonest manager. Would Jesus really extol the virtues of corrupt business practice? We need to remember that the parables of Jesus do have some fairly horrible people used as examples. It is not that we should copy these people, rather there are lessons to be observed from what they do. Jesus told this story not to encourage dishonesty, but to draw attention to the foresight of the steward. He continues: And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Jesus' choice of a "manager" or 'steward' in today's passage is altogether to the point. We need to be constantly reminded that we are the stewards and never the owners of what we possess. We have no absolute right to anything we have. So the question of a successful life is not "How much did you make?", but "How did you use what you had for the general welfare of all?" That is the way to make the friends lesus talks about in the Gospel.
